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### Quick start

The quick start enables a quick setup with many applications. You can find further information in the respective chapters of the operating instructions manual.

#### Mounting

1. Distance from the vessel wall > 200 mm




Fig. 1: Distance of the antenna to the vessel wall/socket configuration

2. Keep the socket short, round off the socket end

For further information see chapter "Mounting".

#### Connect electrically

- 1. Make sure that the power supply corresponds to the specifications on the type label.
- 2. Connect the instrument according to the following illustration




Fig. 2: Electronics and connection compartment, single chamber housing

- 1 Voltage supply, signal output
- 2 For indicating and adjustment module or interface adapter
- 3 For external indicating and adjustment unit
- 4 Ground terminal for connection of the cable screen

#### Set parameters

1. Go via the indicating and adjustment module to the menu "Setup".




 Select in the menu item "Medium" the medium of your application, for example "Gravel/Pebble".




3. Select in the menu item "Application" the vessel, the application and the vessel form, for example, silo.





 Carry out the adjustment in the menu items "Min. adjustment" and "Max. adjustment".



**Parameterization example** The radar sensor measures the distance from the sensor to the product surface. For indication of the real level, an allocation of the measured distance to the percentage height must be carried out.




Fig. 3: Parameterization example

- 1 Min. level ≙ max. meas. distance
- 2 Max. level ≙ min. meas. distance

For this adjustment, the distance is entered with full and virtually empty vessel. If these values are not known, an adjustment with distances, for example, of 10 % and 90 % is also possible. Starting point for these distance specifications is always the seal surface of the thread or flange.

#### Further steps

- 1. In the menu "Additional settings", menu item "Damping" you have to adjust the requested damping of the output signal.
- Select the output characteristics in the menu item "Current output".

### 1 About this document

### 1.1 Function

This operating instructions manual provides all the information you need for mounting, connection and setup as well as important instructions for maintenance and fault rectification. Please read this information before putting the instrument into operation and keep this manual accessible in the immediate vicinity of the device.

### 1.2 Target group

This operating instructions manual is directed to trained qualified personnel. The contents of this manual should be made available to these personnel and put into practice by them.

### 2 For your safety

### 2.1 Authorised personnel

All operations described in this operating instructions manual must be carried out only by trained specialist personnel authorised by the plant operator.

During work on and with the device the required personal protective equipment must always be worn.

### 2.2 Appropriate use

VEGAPULS 67 is a sensor for continuous level measurement.

You can find detailed information on the application range in chapter "*Product description*".

Operational reliability is ensured only if the instrument is properly used according to the specifications in the operating instructions manual as well as possible supplementary instructions.

### 2.3 Warning about incorrect use

Inappropriate or incorrect use of the instrument can give rise to application-specific hazards, e.g. vessel overfill or damage to system components through incorrect mounting or adjustment.

### 2.4 General safety instructions

This is a state-of-the-art instrument complying with all prevailing regulations and guidelines. The instrument must only be operated in a technically flawless and reliable condition. The operator is responsible for the trouble-free operation of the instrument.

During the entire duration of use, the user is obliged to determine the compliance of the necessary occupational safety measures with the current valid rules and regulations and also take note of new regulations.

The safety instructions in this operating instructions manual, the national installation standards as well as the valid safety regulations and accident prevention rules must be observed by the user.

For safety and warranty reasons, any invasive work on the device beyond that described in the operating instructions manual may be carried out only by personnel authorised by the manufacturer. Arbitrary conversions or modifications are explicitly forbidden.

The safety approval markings and safety tips on the device must also be observed.

Depending on the instrument version, the emitting frequencies are in the C or K band range. The low emitting frequencies are far below the internationally approved limit values. When used correctly, there is no danger to health.



### 2.5 CE conformity

The device fulfills the legal requirements of the applicable EC guidelines. By affixing the CE marking, we confirm successful testing of the product.

#### Only with Ex-d-ia version

The instrument is designed for use in an industrial environment. Nevertheless, electromagnetic interference from electrical conductors and radiated emissions must be taken into account, as is usual with a class A instrument according to EN 61326-1. If the instrument is used in a different environment, its electromagnetic compatibility with other devices must be ensured by suitable measures.

### 2.6 NAMUR recommendations

NAMUR is the automation technology user association in the process industry in Germany. The published NAMUR recommendations are accepted as the standard in field instrumentation.

The device fulfills the requirements of the following NAMUR recommendations:

### 2.7 Radio license for Europe

The instrument may only be used in closed vessels made of metal, concrete, or fibre-reinforced plastic.

	3.2 Principle of operation
Application area	The VEGAPULS 67 is a radar sensor for continuous level measure- ment of bulk solids under simple process conditions. It is suitable for smaller silos and vessels.
	The instrument is also suitable for applications in liquids.
Functional principle	The antenna of the radar sensor emits short radar pulses with a duration of approx. 1 ns. These pulses are reflected by the product and received by the antenna as echoes. The transit time of the radar pulses from emission to reception is proportional to the distance and hence to the level. The determined level is converted into an appropriate output signal and outputted as measured value.
	3.3 Packaging, transport and storage
Packaging	Your instrument was protected by packaging during transport. Its capacity to handle normal loads during transport is assured by a test according to DIN EN 24180.
	The packaging of standard instruments consists of environment- friendly, recyclable cardboard. For special versions, PE foam or PE foil is also used. Dispose of the packaging material via specialised recycling companies.
Transport	Transport must be carried out under consideration of the notes on the transport packaging. Nonobservance of these instructions can cause damage to the device.
Transport inspection	The delivery must be checked for completeness and possible transit damage immediately at receipt. Ascertained transit damage or con- cealed defects must be appropriately dealt with.
Storage	Up to the time of installation, the packages must be left closed and stored according to the orientation and storage markings on the outside.

External indicating and adjustment unit	VEGADIS 61 is an external indicating and adjustment unit for sensors with single chamber housing and Ex-d double chamber housing.

### 4 Mounting

### 4.1 General instructions

Screwing in



With instruments with threaded process fitting, suitable tools must be applied for tightening the hexagon.

### **Warning:** The housing must not be used to screw the instrument in! Applying tightening force can damage internal parts of the housing.

Moisture Use the recommended cables (see chapter "Connecting to power supply") and tighten the cable gland.

You can give your instrument additional protection against moisture penetration by leading the connection cable downward in front of the cable entry. Rain and condensation water can thus drain off. This applies mainly to outdoor mounting as well as installation in areas where high humidity is expected (e.g. through cleaning processes) or on cooled or heated vessels.

Suitability for the process conditions Make sure that all parts of the instrument exposed to the process, in particular the active measuring component, process seal and process fitting, are suitable for the existing process conditions. These include above all the process pressure, process temperature as well as the chemical properties of the medium.

You can find the specifications in chapter "*Technical data*" and on the type label.

### 4.2 Collar or adapter flange

For mounting the instrument on a socket, a combi compression flange for DN 80 (ASME 3" or JIS 80) is also available for retro fitting. Optionally, the instrument can be also equipped with an adapter flange from DN 100 (ASME 4" or JIS 100).

With the housing versions plastic, aluminium single chamber and stainless steel, the collar flange can be placed directly over the housing. With the aluminium double chamber housing, retroactive mounting in this way is not possible - the mounting type must be specified with the order.




Fig. 5: Flange mounting of the radar sensor

### 4.3 Mounting strap

The mounting strap enables simple mounting on the vessel wall or silo top. It is suitable for wall, ceiling or boom mounting. Especially in open vessels this is a very easy and effective way to align the sensor to the bulk solid surface.




Fig. 6: Radar sensor with mounting strap

The strap is supplied unassembled and must be screwed to the sensor before setup with three hexagon screws M5 x 10 and spring washers. Max. torque, see chapter "*Technical data*". Required tools: Allen wrench size 4.

There are two ways to screw the strap onto the sensor. Depending on the selected version, the sensors can be swivelled in the strap as follows:

- Single chamber housing
  - Angle of inclination 180°, infinitely variable

Mounting strap



- Angle of inclination in three steps 0°, 90° and 180°
- Double chamber housing
  - Angle of inclination 90°, infinitely variable
  - Angle of inclination in two steps 0° and 90°




Fig. 7: Adjustment of the angle of inclination




Fig. 8: Turning by fastening in the centre

#### 4.4 Instructions for installation

For tight installation of the version with plastic horn antenna with compression or adapter flange, the following conditions must be fulfilled:

- 1. Use suitable flat seal, e.g. of EPDM with Shore hardness 25 or 50
- 2. Make sure the number of flange screws corresponds to the number of flange holes
- 3. Tighten all screws with the torque stated in the technical data

**Polarisation plane** The emitted radar impulses of the radar sensor are electromagnetic waves. The polarisation plane is the direction of the electrical wave component. By turning the instrument in the connection flange or mounting boss, the polarisation can be used to reduce the effects of false echoes.

> The position of the polarisation level is marked by markings on the instrument.




Fig. 9: Position of the polarisation level

#### Installation position

Mount the instrument at least 200 mm (7.874 in) away from the vessel wall.




Fig. 10: Mounting of the radar sensor on the vessel top

If you cannot keep this distance you should carry out a false echo storage before setup. This applies mainly if buildup on the vessel wall is expected. In this case, we recommend repeating a false echo storage later with existing buildup.

Inflowing medium Filling from the top: Mounting should not be too close to the inflowing material as the microwave signal will be interferred. The optimum mounting position is on the opposite of the filling. To avoid strong pollution, the distance to the filter or dust extraction must be as big as possible.




Fig. 11: Mounting of the radar sensor with inflowing medium with filling from the top

**Lateral filling**: With bulk solids silos with lateral pneumatic filling, mounting should not be in the filling stream as the microwave signal will be interferred. The optimum mounting position is next to the filling. To avoid strong pollution, the distance to the filter or dust extraction must be as big as possible.






Fig. 12: Mounting of the radar sensor with inflowing medium with lateral filling

### Socket with plastic horn antenna

A corresponding collar flange for DN 80 (ASME 3" or JIS 80) as well as a suitable adapter flange are available for mounting VEGAPULS 67.

With the housing versions plastic, aluminium single chamber and stainless steel, the collar flange can be placed directly over the housing. With the aluminium double chamber housing, retroactive mounting in this way is not possible - the mounting type must be specified with the order.

Information:

The socket should be as short as possible and the socket end rounded. Thus, false reflections by the vessel socket are reduced.





Fig. 13: Recommended socket mounting



If the medium has good reflective properties, VEGAPULS 67 can also be mounted on a longer socket piece. Recommended values for socket heights are specified in the following illustration. You must carry out a false echo storage afterwards.



The below charts specify the max. socket piece length h depending on the diameter d.

Tip:

In new facilities it is useful to incline the vessel socket in the direction of the outlet. False reflections from the vessel wall are thus reduced and measurement all the way down to the bottom of the conical outlet is possible.






Fig. 15: Alignment in silos

#### Orientation

To detect nearly the complete vessel volume the sensor should be directed in such a way that the measuring beam reaches the lowest level in the vessel, i.e. the outlet.




Fig. 16: Mounting in open vessel






Fig. 17: Mounting on the vessel ceiling



#### Caution:

When mounting on the vessel ceiling mark sure that the sensor does not overfill. Depending on the measured product, this can cause a mechanical damage.

In a cylindrical silo with conical outlet, the mounting iis carried out on a socket. It should be positioned on one third up to the half of the vessel radius.




Fig. 18: Mounting position and orientation

#### Material heaps

Large material heaps are best measured with several instruments, which can be mounted on e.g. traverse cranes. For this type of application it is advantageous to orient the sensor perpendicular to the bulk solid surface.

The sensors do not influence each other.



#### Information:

Keep in mind that for these applications, the sensors are designed for relatively slow level changes. If the sensor is used on a movable boom, the max. measuring rate must be observed (see chapter "*Technical data*").




Fig. 19: Radar sensors on traverse crane

Vessel installations The mounting location of the radar sensor should be a place where no other equipment or fixtures cross the path of the microwave signals.

Vessel installations, such as e.g. ladders, limit switches, heating spirals, struts, etc., can cause false echoes and impair the useful echo. Make sure when planning your measuring site that the radar sensor has a "clear view" to the measured product.

In case of existing vessel installations, a false echo storage should be carried out during setup.

If large vessel installations such as struts or supports cause false echoes, these can be attenuated through supplementary measures. Small, inclined sheet metal baffles above the installations scatter the radar signals and prevent direct interfering reflections.

#### Agitators

If there are agitators in the vessel, a false signal suppression should be carried out with the agitators in motion. This ensures that the interfering reflections from the agitators are saved with the blades in different positions.






Fig. 21: Agitators

### Installation in subsurface enclosures

For level measurements in concrete silos, the sensors are often mounted in protective boxes. These boxes can be for example metallic, closed subsurface enclosures.

Minimal amounts of stray radiation from the sensor can be reflected and strengthened by the walls of the subsurface enclosures. In the case of sensors with plastic housings, this can lead to coupling disturbances. This is avoided by using sensor housings of aluminium or stainless steel as well as electromagnetic absorber material in subsurface enclosures.




Fig. 22: Mounting of the instrument in an subsurface enclosure

Mounting in multiple chamber silo

The silo walls of multiple chamber silos are often made of profile walls, like e.g. profile sheeting, to ensure the required stability. If the radar sensor is mounted very close to a heavily structured vessel wall, substantial interfering reflections can be generated. Hence the sensor should be mounted at a large distance from the separating wall.

The optimum mounting position is on the outer wall of the silo with the sensor oriented towards the outlet in the silo center.






Fig. 23: Installation and orientation in multiple chamber silos




Fig. 24: Installation and orientation in multiple chamber silos

#### Air rinsing

Air rinsing is useful for avoiding buildup, particularly when there is strong condensation. Since VEGAPULS 67 has no direct rinsing air connection, a separate rinsing air connection must be provided in the mounting socket. By inclining this connection towards the top, a particularly effective cleaning of the antenna cover is achieved.




Fig. 25: Purging air connection



### 5 Connecting to power supply

	5.1 Preparing the connection
Safety instructions	Always keep in mind the following safety instructions:
	<ul> <li>Connect only in the complete absence of line voltage</li> <li>If overvoltage surges are expected, overvoltage arresters should be installed</li> </ul>
Voltage supply	Power supply and current signal are carried on the same two-wire cable. The voltage supply range can differ depending on the instrument version.
	The data for power supply are specified in chapter "Technical data".
	Provide a reliable separation between the supply circuit and the mains circuits according to DIN VDE 0106 part 101.
	Keep in mind the following additional factors that influence the operat- ing voltage:
	• Output voltage of the power supply unit can be lower under nomi- nal load (with a sensor current of 20.5 mA or 22 mA in case of fault message)
	• Influence of additional instruments in the circuit (see load values in chapter " <i>Technical data</i> ")
Connection cable	The instrument is connected with standard two-wire cable without screen. If electromagnetic interference is expected which is above the test values of EN 61326-1 for industrial areas, screened cable should be used.
	For instruments with housing and cable gland, use cable with round cross-section. A cable outer diameter of $5 \dots 9 \text{ mm} (0.2 \dots 0.35 \text{ in})$ ensures the seal effect of the cable gland. If you are using cable with a different diameter, exchange the seal or use a suitable cable gland.
	We generally recommend the use of screened cable for HART multi- drop mode.
Cable gland ½ NPT	With plastic housing, the NPT cable gland or the Conduit steel tube must be screwed without grease into the threaded insert.
	Max. torque for all housings see chapter "Technical data"
Cable screening and grounding	If screened cable is necessary, connect the cable screen on both ends to ground potential. In the sensor, the screen must be connected directly to the internal ground terminal. The ground terminal on the outside of the housing must be connected to the potential equalisa- tion (low impedance).
	If potential equalisation currents are expected, the connection on the processing side must be made via a ceramic capacitor (e. g. 1 nF, 1500 V). The low frequency potential equalisation currents are thus suppressed, but the protective effect against high frequency interference signals remains.





#### Warning:

Significant potential differences exist inside galvanization plants as well as on vessels with cathodic corrosion protection. Considerable equalisation currents can flow over the cable screen if the screen is grounded on both ends.

To avoid this in such applications, the cable screen must be connected to ground potential only at one end (in the switching cabinet). The cable screen must **not** be connected to the internal ground terminal in the sensor and the outer ground terminal on the housing must **not** be connected to the potential equalisation!

#### Information:

The metal parts of the instrument (process fitting, transmitter, concentric tube, etc.) are conductively connected with the inner and outer ground terminal on the housing. This connection exists either directly via connecting metallic parts or, in case of instruments with external electronics, via the screen of the special connection cable.

You can find specifications on the potential connections inside the instrument in chapter "*Technical data*".

In the sensor, the screen must be connected<br/>directly to the internal ground terminal. ### 5.2 Connecting

The voltage supply and signal output are connected via the springloaded terminals in the housing.

The connection to the indicating and adjustment module or to the interface adapter is carried out via contact pins in the housing.

#### Information:

The terminal block is pluggable and can be removed from the electronics. To do this, lift the terminal block with a small screwdriver and pull it out. When inserting the terminal block again, you should hear it snap in.

- 1. Unscrew the housing cover
- 2. If an indicating and adjustment module is installed, remove it by turning it slightly to the left.
- 3. Loosen compression nut of the cable entry
- Remove approx. 10 cm (4 in) of the cable mantle, strip approx. 1 cm (0.4 in) of insulation from the ends of the individual wires





5. Insert the cable into the sensor through the cable entry

6. Insert the wire ends into the terminals according to the wiring plan

#### Information:

Solid cores as well as flexible cores with cable end sleeves are inserted directly into the terminal openings. In case of flexible cores without end sleeves, press the terminal head with a small screwdriver; the terminal opening is freed. When the screwdriver is released, the terminal closes again.

You can find further information to the max. wire cross-section under "Technical data/Electromechanical data"

- 7. Check the hold of the wires in the terminals by lightly pulling on them
- 8. Connect the screen to the internal ground terminal, connect the outer ground terminal to potential equalisation
- 9. Tighten the compression nut of the cable entry. The seal ring must completely encircle the cable
- 10. Place probably existing indicating and adjustment module back on
- 11. Screw the housing cover back on

The electrical connection is hence finished.




Fig. 27: Electronics and connection compartment, single chamber housing




Fig. 28: Electronics compartment, double chamber housing




Fig. 29: Connection compartment, double chamber housing




Fig. 31: Electronics compartment, double chamber housing




Fig. 32: Connection compartment, Ex-d double chamber housing




Fig. 33: Top view of the plug connector




Fig. 34: Wire assignment fix-connected connection cable

### 5.7 Switch-on phase

After connecting the instrument to power supply or after a voltage recurrence, the instrument carries out a self-check for approx. 30 s:

• Internal check of the electronics



- Indication of the instrument type, hardware and software version, measurement loop name on the display or PC
- Indication of the status message "F 105 Determine measured value" on the display or PC
- The output signal jumps to the set error current

As soon as a plausible measured value is found, the corresponding current is outputted to the signal cable. The value corresponds to the actual level as well as the settings already carried out, e.g. factory setting.



## 6 Set up with the indicating and adjustment module

### 6.1 Insert indicating and adjustment module

The indicating and adjustment module can be inserted into the sensor and removed any time. Four positions displaced by 90° can be selected. It is not necessary to interrupt the power supply.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Unscrew the housing cover
- 2. Place the indicating and adjustment module in the requested position onto the electronics and turn to the right until it snaps in
- 3. Screw housing cover with inspection window tightly back on

Removal is carried out in reverse order.

The indicating and adjustment module is powered by the sensor, an additional connection is not necessary.




Fig. 36: Insertion of the indicating and adjustment module with double chamber housing




Fig. 37: Indicating and adjustment elements

#### Adjustment system The sensor is adjusted via the four keys of the indicating and adjustment module. The LC display indicates the individual menu items. The functions of the individual keys are shown in the above illustration. Approx. 10 minutes after the last pressing of a key, an automatic reset to measured value indication is triggered. Any values not confirmed with *[OK]* will not be saved.

### 6.3 Parameter adjustment

Through the parameter adjustment the instrument is adapted to the application conditions. The parameter adjustment is carried out via an adjustment menu.

#### Main menu

The main menu is divided into five sections with the following functions:



Setup: Settings, e.g., for measurement loop name, medium, application, vessel, adjustment, signal output

Display: Settings, e.g., for language, measured value display, lighting

Diagnosis: Information, e.g. on the instrument status, pointer, reliability, simulation, echo curve

Further settings: Instrument unit, false signal suppression, linearisation curve, reset, date/time, reset, copy function

Info: Instrument name, hardware and software version, calibration date, instrument features

### Information: In this operation

In this operating instructions manual, the instrument-specific parameters in the menu sections "*Setup*", "*Diagnosis*" and "*Additional settings*" are described. The general parameters in these menu section are described in the operating instructions manual "*Indicating and adjustment module*".




You can find in the operating instructions manual "*Indicating and ad-justment module*" also the description of the menu sections "*Display*" and "*Info*".

In the main menu point "Setup", the individual submenu points should be selected subsequently and provided with the correct parameters to ensure the optimum adjustment of the measurement. The procedure is described in the following.

Setup/Medium Each medium has different reflection properties. With liquids, further interfering factors are fluctuation product surface and foam generation. With bulk solids, these are dust generation, material cone and additional echoes from the vessel wall.

To adapt the sensor to these different measuring conditions, the selection "*Liquid*" or "*Bulk solid*" should be made in this menu item.



Through this selection, the sensor is adapted perfectly to the product and measurement reliability, particularly in products with poor reflective properties, is considerably increased.

Enter the requested parameters via the appropriate keys, save your settings with *[OK]* and jump to the next menu item with the *[ESC]* and the *[->]* key.

Setup/Application In addition to the medium, also the application, i.e. the measuring site, can influence the measurement.

With this menu item, the sensor can be adapted to the applications. The adjustment possibilities depend on the selection "*Liquid*" or "*Bulk solid*" under "*Medium*".

#### Caution:

If a separation of liquids with different dielectric figure occurs in the vessel, for example through condensation, the radar sensor can detect under certain circumstances only the medium with the higher dielectric figure. Keep in mind that layer interfaces can cause faulty measurements.

If you want to measure the total height of both liquids reliably, please contact our service department or use an instrument specially designed for interface measurement.



Setup/Adjustment Since a radar sensor is a distance measuring instrument, the distance from the sensor to the product surface is measured. For indication of the real level, an allocation of the measured distance to the percentage height must be carried out.

To perform the adjustment, enter the distance with full and empty vessel, see the following example:






Fig. 38: Parameter adjustment example min./max. adjustment

If these values are not known, an adjustment with the distances of for example 10 % and 90 % is possible. Starting point for these distance specifications is always the seal surface of the thread or flange. By means of these settings, the real level will be calculated.

The real product level during this adjustment is not important, because the min./max. adjustment is always carried out without changing the product level. These settings can be made ahead of time without the instrument having to be installed.







## Diagnosis/Measurement reliability

When non-contact level sensors are used, the measurement can be influenced by the respective process conditions. In this menu item, the measurement reliability of the level echo is displayed as dB value. The measurement reliability equals signal strength minus noise. The higher the value, the more reliable the measurement. With a functioning measurement, the values are > 10 dB.

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



#### Diagnoses/Curve indication

The "*Echo curve*" shows the signal strength of the echoes over the measuring range in dB. The signal strength enables an evaluation of the quality of the measurement.



The "*False signal suppression*" displays the saved false echoes (see menu "*Additional settings*") of the empty vessel with signal strength in "dB" over the measuring range.



A comparison of echo curve and false signal suppression allows a more accurate conclusion on measurement reliability. The selected curve is continuously updated. With the *[OK]* key, a submenu with zoom functions is opened:

- "X-Zoom": Zoom function for the meas. distance
- "Y-Zoom": 1, 2, 5 and 10x signal magnification in "dB"
- "Unzoom": Reset the presentation to the nominal measuring range with single magnification

Diagnostics/Echo curve With the function "*Echo curve memory*" the echo curve can be saved at the time of setup. This is generally recommended; for using the Asset Management functions it is absolutely necessary. If possible, the curve should be saved with a low level in the vessel.

With the adjustment software PACTware and the PC, the high resolution echo curve can be displayed and used to recognize signal changes over the operating time. In addition, the echo curve of the setup can be also displayed in the echo curve window and compared with the actual echo curve.

#### Additional adjustments/ False signal suppression

The following circumstances cause interfering reflections and can influence the measurement:

- High sockets
- Vessel installations such as struts
- Agitators
- Buildup or welded joints on vessel walls



#### Note:

A false signal suppression detects, marks and saves these false signals so that they are no longer taken into account for level measurement.

This should be done with the low level so that all potential interfering reflections can be detected.



Check the distance to the product surface, because if an incorrect (too large) value is entered, the existing level will be saved as false signal. The filling level would then no longer be detectable in this area.



If a false signal suppression has already been created in the sensor, the following menu window appears when selecting "*False signal suppression*":



The menu item "*Delete*" is used to completely delete an already created false signal suppression. This is useful if the saved false signal suppression no longer matches the metrological conditions in the vessel.


The menu item "*Extend*" is used to extend an already created false signal suppression. This is useful if a false signal suppression was carried out with a too high level and not all false signals could be detected. When selecting "*Extend*", the distance to the product surface of the created false signal suppression is displayed. This value can now be changed and the false signal suppression can be extended to this range.

Additional adjustments/ Linearization curve A linearization is necessary for all vessels in which the vessel volume does not increase linearly with the level - e.g. in a horizontal cylindrical or spherical tank - and the indication or output of the volume is required. Corresponding linearization curves are preprogrammed for these vessels. They represent the correlation between the level percentage and vessel volume.

By activating the appropriate curve, the volume percentage of the vessel is displayed correctly. If the volume should not be displayed in percent but e.g. in I or kg, a scaling can be also set in the menu item "*Display*".



**Basic settings:** Resetting the parameter settings incl. special and laboratory parameters to the default values of the respective instrument. A created false signal suppression, user programmable linearization curve as well as the measured value memory will be deleted.

Setup: Resetting of the parameter settings to the default values of the respective instrument in the menu item Setup. User-generated false signal suppression, user-programmed linearization curve, measured value memory as well as event memory remain untouched. The linearization is set to linear.

**False signal suppression:** Deleting a previously created false signal suppression. The false signal suppression created in the factory remains active.

**Peak values measured value:** Resetting of the measured min. and max. distances to the actual measured value.

## 6.4 Saving the parameter adjustment data

We recommended noting the adjusted data, e.g. in this operating instructions manual, and archiving them afterwards. They are thus available for multiple use or service purposes.

If the instrument is equipped with an indicating and adjustment module, the data in the sensor can be saved in the indicating and adjustment module. The procedure is described in the operating instructions manual "*Indicating and adjustment module*" in the menu item "*Copy sensor data*". The data remain there permanently even if the sensor power supply fails.

The following data or settings for adjustment of the indicating and adjustment module are saved:

- All data of the menu "Setup" and "Display"
- In the menu "Additional adjustments" the items "Sensor-specific units, temperature unit and linearization"
- The values of the user programmable linearisation curve

The function can also be used to transfer settings from one instrument to another instrument of the same type. If it is necessary to exchange a sensor, the indicating and adjustment module is inserted into the replacement instrument and the data are likewise written into the sensor via the menu item "*Copy sensor data*".




Fig. 40: Connecting the PC via HART to the signal cable

This applies, e.g. to the VEGA instruments VEGATRENN 149A, VEGAMET 381, VEGAMET 391. Common Ex separators are also usually equipped with a sufficient current limitation resistance. In

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such cases, the interface converter can be connected parallel to the 4 ... 20 mA cable (dashed line in the previous illustration).

For parameter adjustment of the sensor via a Windows PC, the configuration software PACTware and a suitable instrument driver (DTM) according to FDT standard are required. The up-to-date PACTware version as well as all available DTMs are compiled in a DTM Collection. The DTMs can also be integrated into other frame applications according to FDT standard.

#### • Note: To ens

To ensure that all instrument functions are supported, you should always use the latest DTM Collection. Furthermore, not all described functions are included in older firmware versions. You can download the latest instrument software from our homepage. A description of the update procedure is also available in the Internet.

Further setup steps are described in the operating instructions manual "*DTM Collection/PACTware*" attached to each DTM Collection and which can also be downloaded from the Internet. Detailed descriptions are available in the online help of PACTware and the DTMs.




Fig. 41: Example of a DTM view

Standard/Full versionAll device DTMs are available as a free-of-charge standard version<br/>and as a full version that must be purchased. In the standard version,<br/>all functions for complete setup are already included. An assistant for<br/>simple project configuration simplifies the adjustment considerably.<br/>Saving/printing the project as well as import/export functions are also<br/>part of the standard version.

In the full version there is also an extended print function for complete project documentation as well as a save function for measured value



and echo curves. In addition, there is a tank calculation program as well as a multiviewer for display and analysis of the saved measured value and echo curves.

The standard version is available as a download under <u>www.vega.</u> <u>com/downloads</u> and "*Software*". The full version is available on CD from the agency serving you.

## 7.3 Saving the parameter adjustment data

We recommend documenting or saving the parameter adjustment data via PACTware. That way the data are available for multiple use or service purposes.

## 9 Diagnosis, Asset Management and service

#### 9.1 Maintenance

If the device is used correctly, no maintenance is required in normal operation.

In some applications, buildup on the antenna system can influence the measuring result. Depending on the sensor and application, make arrangements to avoid strong pollution of the antenna system. If necessary, clean the antenna system in certain intervals.

## 9.2 Measured value and event memory

The instrument has several memories which are available for diagnosis purposes. The data remain even with voltage interruption.

Measured value memory Up to 60,000 measured values can be stored in the sensor in a ring memory. Each entry contains date/time as well as the respective measured value. Storable values are for example:

- Distance
- Filling height
- Percentage value
- Lin. percent
- Scaled
- Current value
- Meas. reliability
- Electronics temperature

When the instrument is shipped, the measured value memory is active and stores distance, measurement certainty and electronics temperature every 3 minutes.

The requested values and recording conditions are set via a PC with PACTware/DTM or the control system with EDD. Data are thus read out and also reset.

**Event memory** Up to 500 events are automatically stored with a time stamp in the sensor (non-deletable). Each entry contains date/time, event type, event description and value. Event types are for example:

- Modification of a parameter
- Switching on and off times
- Status messages (according to NE 107)
- Error messages (according to NE 107)

The data are read out via a PC with PACTware/DTM or the control system with EDD.

**Echo curve memory** The echo curves are stored with date and time and the corresponding echo data. The memory is divided into two sections:

Echo curve of the setup: This is used as reference echo curve for the measurement conditions during setup. Changes in the measurement conditions during operation or buildup on the sensor can thus be recognized. The echo curve of the setup is stored via:



- PC with PACTware/DTM
- Control system with EDD
- Indicating and adjustment module

**Further echo curves:** Up to 10 echo curves can be stored in a ring buffer in this memory section. Further echo curves are stored via:

- PC with PACTware/DTM
- Control system with EDD

## 9.3 Asset Management function

The instrument features self-monitoring and diagnostics according to NE 107 and VDI/VDE 2650. In addition to the status messages in the following tables there are more detailed error messages available under the menu item "*Diagnostics*" via the indicating and adjustment module, PACTware/DTM and EDD.

Status messages

The status messages are classified in the following categories:

- Failure
- Function check
- Out of specification
- Maintenance requirement




Fig. 42: Pictograms of the status messages

Failure: Due to a malfunction in the instrument, a failure message is outputted.

This status message is always active. It cannot be deactivated by the user.

**Function check:** The instrument is in operation, the measured value is temporarily invalid (for example during simulation).

This status message is inactive by default. It can be activated by the user via PACTware/DTM or EDD.

**Out of specification:** The measured value is unstable because the instrument specification is exceeded (e.g. electronics temperature).

This status message is inactive by default. It can be activated by the user via PACTware/DTM or EDD.

**Maintenance:** Due to external influences, the instrument function is limited. The measurement is affected, but the measured value is still valid. Plan in maintenance for the instrument because a failure is expected in the near future (e.g. due to buildup).



This status message is inactive by default. It can be activated by the user via PACTware/DTM or EDD.



If the electronics module is defective, it can be replaced by the user.



In Ex applications only one instrument and one electronics module with respective Ex approval may be used.

If there is no electronics module available on site, the electronics module can be ordered through the agency serving you. The electronics modules are adapted to the respective sensor and differ in signal output or voltage supply.

The new electronics module must be loaded with the default settings of the sensor. These are the options:



- In the factory
- Or on site by the user

In both cases, the serial number of the sensor is needed. The serial numbers are stated on the type label of the instrument, on the inside of the housing as well as on the delivery note.

When loading on site, first of all the order data must be downloaded from the Internet (see operating instructions manual "*Electronics module*").






Fig. 53: Deviation under reference conditions




Fig. 54: Voltage diagram




Fig. 55: Housing versions in protection IP 66/IP 68 (0.2 bar) - with integrated indicating and adjustment module the housing is 9 mm/0.35 in higher




Fig. 56: Housing versions in protection IP 66/IP 68 (0.2 bar) - with integrated indicating and adjustment module the housing is 9 mm/0.35 in higher




Fig. 57: Housing versions in protection IP 66/IP 68 (1 bar) - with integrated indicating and adjustment module the housing is 9 mm/0.35 in higher




Fig. 58: Housing versions in protection IP 66/IP 68 (0.2 bar) - with integrated indicating and adjustment module the housing is 9 mm/0.35 in higher




Fig. 59: Housing versions in protection IP 66/IP 68 (1 bar) - with integrated indicating and adjustment module the housing is 9 mm/0.35 in higher




Fig. 60: VEGAPULS 67, mounting strap in 170 or 300 mm length




Fig. 61: VEGAPULS 67, compression flange suitable for DN 80 PN 16/ASME 3" 150lbs/JIS80 10K




Fig. 62: VEGAPULS 67, adapter flange
